
Post-operative Instructions after Tonsillectomy & Adenoidectomy

Tonsillectomy and Adenoidectomy

The tonsils and adenoids produce antibodies to help defend against infection entering via the nose or mouth. The tonsils are located on each side at the back of the throat. The adenoids are located behind the nose and

above the roof of the mouth. They often get infected and swollen due to a variety of causes ranging from abscesses, secondary infection due to primary infection in the ear, etc. Enlarged tonsils/adenoids may also lead to breathing difficulty, mouth breathing, snoring and can even cause recurrent ear



infections when they block the Eustachian tube - the small tube connecting the ear to the back of the nose. In such cases, they need to be removed surgically, the procedures commonly known as Tonsillectomy and Adenoidectomy respectively.

Even after their removal, the body's ability to ward off infections remains unaffected, as there are other protective mechanisms.

Post-operative care for Tonsillectomy and Adenoidectomy

 The patient should have a cold liquid or semi-solid diet such as ice-creams, custard, jelly, cold milk, cold juices for one day after the surgery. Soft, non-spicy diet at room temperature can be started the day following the surgery. Normal diet can be resumed 5-6 days following the

surgery. Avoid hard, crunchy and chewy foods for upto 10 days following the surgery as they will increase the risk of bleeding. In case an adenoidectomy alone has been performed without a tonsillectomy, the patient can resume a normal diet from the day following the surgery.



- No strenuous activity is to be performed for 10 days following the operation.
- Gargle at least 4-5 times a day and after every meal as prescribed.

- Pain is expected for a week after the surgery for which pain killers have been prescribed. Take them as advised. The pain will be less if the patient takes regular feeds and resumes
- Report immediately to the Casualty department in case of bleeding or in case of fever above 100 F.
